

# *Citing Works at MMS*

---

A list of *Works Cited* or a *Bibliography* should appear at the end of a research paper. Alphabetize the list by the last names of the authors, editors, or title if there is no author. **Double-space citations that are more than one line. Please note that samples below are not double spaced. This was done to save space.** Do not indent the first line of each work, but indent any additional lines 5 spaces (1/2 inch). If your source does NOT appear below, check the *MLS Style and Formatting Guide* either online or at the MMS Library. If you are handwriting your Works Cited page, underline text instead of using italics.

## **PRINT PUBLICATIONS**

### **Book with One Author:**

Lastname, Firstname. *Title of Book*. Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication. Medium of Publication.

Gleick, James. *Chaos: Making a New Science*. New York: Penguin, 1987. Print.

### **Book with Two or Three Authors:** (separate names with commas)

Gillespie, Paula, and Neal Lerner. *The Allyn and Bacon Guide to Peer Tutoring*. Boston: Allyn, 2000. Print.

*\*If the book has more than three authors, use only the first author and then the words: et al.*

### **Book by a Corporate Author or Organization:**

American Allergy Association. *Allergies in Children*. New York: Random, 1998. Print.

### **Book with No Author:**

*Encyclopedia of Indiana*. New York: Somerset, 1993. Print.

### **An Edition of a Book:**

Crowley, Sharon, and Debra Hawhee. *Ancient Rhetorics for Contemporary Students*. 3<sup>rd</sup> ed. New York: Pearson/Longman, 2004. Print.

### **A Work Prepared by an Editor:**

Bronte, Charlotte. *Jane Eyre*. Ed. Margaret Smith. Oxford: Oxford UP, 1998. Print.

### **A Work in an Anthology, Reference, or Collection:**

Last name, First name. "Title of Essay." *Title of Collection*. Ed. Editor's Name(s). Place of Publication: Publisher, Year. Page range. Medium of work.

Harris, Muriel. "Talk to Me: Engaging Reluctant Writers." *A Tutor's Guide: Helping Writers One to One*. Ed. Ben Rafoth. Portsmouth, NH: Heinemann, 2000. 24-34. Print.

### **Article in a Magazine:**

Author(s). "Title of Article." *Title of Periodical* Day Month Year: pages. Medium of publication.

Smith, John. "Wind Tunnels." *Time* 15 Nov. 2009: 42-43. Print.

**Article in a Newspaper:** (for less known papers include the following [City, State])

Brubaker, Bill. "New Health Center Targets County's Uninsured Patients." *Washington Post* 24 May 2007: LZ01. Print.

Behre, Robert. "Presidential Hopefuls Get Final Crack at Core of S.C. Democrats." *Posand Courier* [Charleston, SC] 29 Apr. 2007: A11. Print.

**Journal:**

Author(s). "Title of Article." *Title of Journal* Volume.Issue (Year): pages. Medium of publication.

Bagchi, Alaknanda. "Conflicting Nationalisms." *Tulsa Studies in Women's Literature* 15.1 (1996): 41-50. Print.

**An Interview conducted by you:**

Purdue, Pete. Personal interview. 1 Dec. 2000.

**Films or Movies:**

*The Usual Suspects*. Dir. Bryan Singer. Perf. Kevin Spacey, Gabriel Byrne, Chazz Palminteri, Stephen Baldwin, and Benecio del Toro. Polygram, 1995. Film.

**Broadcast Television or Radio Program:**

"The Blessing Way." *The X-Files*. Fox. WXIA, Atlanta. 19 Jul. 1998. Television.

**Sound Recordings:**

Foo Fighters. *In Your Honor*. RCA, 2005. CD.

**Notes about Citing Information from the Internet**

MLA style does NOT require a URL to be included in the citation. If your teacher requires one anyway, MLA suggests that the URL appear in angle brackets [ ] after the date of access. Break URLs only after slashes.

Remember to use *n.p.* if no publisher name is available and *n.d.* if no publishing date is given.

**Citing an Entire Web Site:**

Editor, author, or compiler name (if available). *Name of Site*. Version number. Name of institution/organization affiliated with the site (sponsor or publisher), date of resource creation (if available). Medium of publication. Date of access.

**A Page on a Web Site:**

"How to Make Vegetarian Chili." *eHow.com*. eHow, n.d. Web. 24 Feb. 2009.

**An Image (Including a Painting, Sculpture, or Photograph):**

Goya, Francisco. *The Family of Charles IV*. 1800. Museo Nacional del Prado, Madrid. *Museo Nacional del Prado*. Web. 22 May 2006.

**An Article from an Online Database (or Other Electronic Subscription Service):**
