

Achievements:

- Continued to strengthen the Town's financial position through growth in undesignated Fund Balance in the General Fund, which will be beneficial from the standpoint of future bond ratings, and helped the Town Council adopt a new fiscal policy relative to the use of unbudgeted permitting revenues.
- Planned and implemented the third installment of the 12-session Mansfield Local Government Academy that educates participants on all aspects of municipal programs, services and operations.
- Proceeded with expanded implementation of a web/cloud-based financial management system (ClearGov) that enables the Town and Mansfield Board of Education (MBOE) to develop detailed operating and capital budgets, as well as comprehensive budget books, in a manner that promotes efficiency, reduces the potential for human error, and improves the accessibility of budget data to the general public.
- Successfully implemented revenue collection and student activity modules in MUNIS, the Town's financial management system.
- Maintained a tax collection rate of over 98.5%.
- Awarded the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the FY 2023/24 Budget.
- Commenced with October 1, 2024 statutorily required 5-year Town-wide revaluation project.
- Carried out successful competitive selection and onboarding processes for four new members of the Town's leadership team: Library Director, Fire Chief, Director of Human Services, and Director of Facilities.
- Made progress on municipal facilities master planning with a particular focus on community engagement relative to community values and preference with respect to possible municipal facility upgrades/projects. Community engagement efforts employed a variety of in-person and digital approaches to reduce barriers to participation. These efforts are going to prove important in informing future decision-making as we continue planning for the future of Mansfield during a period of transformational change.
- Completed a \$5,000 grant-funded project to straighten, repair, and restore six historical headstones in Town cemeteries.
- Obtained an \$8,000 grant to expand the Town's confidential vital records storage capacity and install a laminate top to the top of our map cabinets to provide a smooth and even surface for map and record books to be placed on during research, preventing damage to books. Stewarded by the Town Clerk.
- Expanded recording options for customers by accepting eRecordings from two prominent vendors and

General Government (continued)

- Implemented PropertyCheck to provide owners with a free way to monitor their property for fraud.
- The Town Clerks Office achieved performance benchmarks in furtherance and enhancement of accessibility, preservation, customer service and knowledge.
- Completed construction of the new roof and installation of a corresponding roof-mounted solar system at Mansfield Middle School (MMS) (a roughly \$3 million project). This project required close coordination with members of the MMS Roof Building Committee, Town and Mansfield Public Schools (MPS) Officials, Owner's Project Manager (Collier's Project Leaders), Architecture/Design Firm (Silver Petrucelli), and the General Contractor (Imperial Company).
- Additional progress was made relative to compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and facility accessibility improvements more generally in a number of Town buildings, including the Municipal Offices, Mansfield Public Library, Mansfield Senior Center, Parks and Recreation facilities, and MMS.
- The Town and MPS collaborated on a grant to improve indoor air quality at MMS. This HVAC grant program is offered by the State of Connecticut and is being administered by the Department of Administrative Services. The Town and MBOE evaluated existing and future HVAC projects and determined that the third floor and gymnasium of MMS are in need of HVAC work, with a cost estimate of \$2.8M. As the state reimbursement rate of this project is approximately 76%, there was a 24% (~\$670K) local matching funds requirement to support the project. The CT Department of Administrative Services subsequently informed the Town it was awarding a \$2,129,960 in grant funds to match our local portion previously authorized to complete a \$2.8 million project. Construction will commence in 2025.
- Worked with the Library on the digital literacy initiative to help citizens overcome economic barriers to Internet and technology access.
- Made improvements to our hybrid meeting capabilities to support open access to Town meetings.
- Collaborated with the Facilities Management Department to expand wireless access coverage for citizens, including at two of our active park locations.
- Collaborated with the Communications Specialist and our website vendor (Civic Plus) to move forward on designing an updated and enhanced website template set to better serve the public.
- Monitored evolving cybersecurity threats and deployed new safeguards to best safeguard users and equipment from potential online threats.

Community Development

Community Development aims to provide residents with a community that promotes and protects public safety, health and welfare, environmental quality, encourages economic activity and full employment, rewards creative enterprise, and fosters full citizen engagement. These departments play a crucial role in the present and future direction of Mansfield and the overall quality of life of our residents.

Achievements:

- Began inspection services at the Standard at Four Corners (housing), Eagleville Green (housing), and Champagne Motors projects.
- Maintained inspectors professional development requirements as mandated by state statute.
- Hired and trained two new inspectors.

Multi-Family Development



Eagleville Green located on Route 275 just east of Maple Road is anticipated to open in 2025 and includes 42 units--34 affordable, 8 market rate.



The Standard at Four Corners located on Route 195 just past Four Corners heading toward Tolland is anticipated to open in August of 2025 and includes 392 units—35 affordable and 17 workforce are included as part of this development. There will also be 15,600 square feet of retail commercial development.

Community Development (continued)

- **Multi-Family Development**

- Since 2020, 1,243 multi-family residential units have been permitted in Mansfield. All but 42 of these units are located in the Four Corners and King Hill areas of town. Once completed, these developments will include:
 - ◆ 125 affordable units for households earning no more than 80% of the area median income (AMI).
 - ◆ 36 units for households earning no more than 120% of the AMI.
- The area median income in Mansfield for a household of four is \$92,176.
- In addition to the affordable units included in these developments, nearly \$5 million will be added to the Town's Affordable Housing Trust to support the construction of additional affordable housing in Mansfield. - **Multi Family Regulation Update**

- In August, the Planning and Zoning Commission extended the moratorium on new housing developments over 5 units or with an average density greater than 3 units per acre until December 31, 2024.
- The moratorium extension is providing the Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) the needed time to refine the draft Planned Housing Design District (PHDD) Regulations introduced this past spring. The PHDD regulations are designed to:
 - ◆ Encourage the creation of diverse, attainable, and equitable multi-family and compact residential housing options that address the varied needs of Mansfield residents, including singles, families, seniors, students, and individuals with special needs.
 - ◆ Promote neighborhoods that are well-designed, sensitive to their context, human-scaled, pedestrian-friendly, and climate-resilient, while protecting and enhancing environmentally sensitive areas.
 - ◆ Provide a flexible, site-specific framework for multi-family and compact residential projects, ensuring they are consistent with the goals of the Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD).
- After several public hearings and PZC workshops, the public hearing on this regulation is expected to close on November 18, 2024, with a decision on the proposed regulation expected on December 2, 2024.

- **The Mansfield Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD) Update is Underway**

- The Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD) update is moving forward. Throughout 2025, there will be many opportunities for community input.

- **Northwest Mansfield Vision and Strategy Plan**

- Work on the NW Mansfield Vision and Strategy Plan continues. Once adopted, to strengthen the plan's impact, the NW Plan will be incorporated into the Town's Plan of Conservation and Development so the recommendations are part of the overall vision for the Town.





Community Services

Mansfield

Community Services provide human services, library, and recreation services to our residents. Their programs aim to enrich the lives of our citizens through activities, programs and facilities designed to foster creativity, help resolve and prevent problems, and provide healthy recreational activities. Community Services plans and assists in the development and maintenance of harmonious personal relationships

Achievements:

- Received funding from Traveling Toys, LLC and the Friends of the Mansfield Library for the purpose of creating a Toy Library for children and teens.
- Welcomed 51,838 visitors to the Library (an increase of over 6,000 from the previous fiscal year).
- Hosted 412 in-person and virtual programs at the Mansfield Public Library with 11,707 attendees (an increase of over 3,700 from the previous year).

- Launched the Digital Navigator program which provides one-on-one technology support and technology classes to the community both in the library and at partner organizations and outreach events.
- Launched MuseumKey which allows patrons to reserve passes to museums and other local attraction online up to 60 days in advance.



- Expanded Senior Center service that includes:
 - Increased visits/"sign-ins" by 20% in the past fiscal year (over 13,000 recorded sign-ins).
 - Our nutritional program was evaluated and improved to replace precooked TVCCA meals. We started preparing all of our meals from scratch in-house, offering them for both dine-in and takeout. This resulted in over 150% growth in this program. We started with two days per week and increased to three days quickly. Total meals served in FY 23/24 were: 3,884 dine in meals and 1,570 takeout meals.
 - Expanded our transportation program to include an additional part-time driver for medical appointments as well as trips for seniors.
 - Continued investment in community education programs.
 - Continued utilization of wellness visits for seniors at reduced rates.
- Continued to provide ongoing mental health services and support groups within the Senior Center programming, with a focus on addressing loneliness, to include, but not limited to increased congregational meal opportunities.
- Increased outreach to the community to increase awareness of our Community Development Block Grant (CDBG/housing rehab program). We have increased our projects in the past year with six current housing rehabilitation projects in different stages of this development/construction.

Community Services (continued)

- Human Services served a total of 648 unique individuals, with 2,887 visits.
- Continued to grow and facilitate the Mansfield Farms to Families Program to support food-insecure homes and local farmers. FY 2024 ended with a total increase of approximately 25% to serve 127 families or 263 Individuals.
- Increased outreach opportunities, with a focus on growing our home visits to community members. The focus of these home visits is to help aide with application processing, economic support, food support, and overall wellness visits.
- Implemented Trauma Screeners to intake forms for youth and adults in June 2024.
- Adopted recognition of PTSD Awareness Month and Suicide Awareness Month, with a focus on increasing awareness of these campaigns in the future.
- Increased access to services (website) regarding mental health resources and veteran resources.
- Youth Services implemented the first Wellness Fair for Middle School aged youth, which was a huge success, quickly filling up the 50 spots that were identified.
- Youth Services held its second annual “Celebrate Pride” event in partnership with other town and local entities to support diversity and celebrate the LGBTQIA2S+ community.
- Completed a draft comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan and Financial Sustainably Strategy.
- Increased general participation and membership use of the Mansfield Community Center.
- Oversaw planning, acquisition, and management of Town parks and improvement projects, working collaboratively with several Town departments.
- Continued to respond to the increased public interest and use of Town parks, trails, playgrounds, athletic facilities, and other outdoor recreation options and provide equitable access to outdoor recreation options.
- Collaboratively worked with Mansfield Schools, Human Services and other Town departments to provide before/afterschool programming and summer camps for Mansfield families.
- Oversaw management of the Town employee wellness program.
- Celebrated the 20th anniversary of the Mansfield Community Center’s opening.



Public Safety

The Public Safety service unit serves to preserve peace and good order, to protect persons and property, and to ensure the safety of the Town's citizens. The unit's goal is to create an environment in which people can move about safely and feel confident that they and their property are protected from harm through programs that reduce crime and fire, provide emergency medical services, and minimize the impact of disaster.

Achievements:

- The Mansfield Fire Department responded to over 2,544 emergency calls for service. Approximately 70% of these calls were for Emergency Medical Services.
- Conducted and completed the hiring process for a new Fire Chief.
- Squad 107, a 2004 Seagrave Rescue Pumper, completed a \$225,000 renovation and refurbishment so it can continue to serve this community for several more years.
- Completed interior renovations to the Four Corners Fire Station in preparation for an increased need for services in the Northwest section of town.
- Hired two additional full-time Firefighter/EMTs in response to our ever-increasing call volumes. Currently, we have five firefighters on duty 24 hours a day, and are working towards bringing this up to at least six.
- The Resident State Trooper's Office was instrumental in the planning and execution of the State Police Operations response at UConn's NCAA Men's Basketball Championship.
- Obtained \$64,000 for DUI funding for enhanced enforcement operations.
- Conducted the DARE program for 5th grade students at Mansfield Middle School.
- Conducted proactive off campus party patrol operations to improve quality of life issues for residents.
- Worked closely with UConn Off-Campus housing and administration.
- Two of our Resident Troopers were awarded the 2024 Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) award as top DUI enforcers for the entire Troop C area.
- Sergeant King is now an instructor for ALERRT Level 1 (Law Enforcement Rescue Model) and AAIR (Active Attack Integrated Response).
- Participated in community events such as Celebrate Mansfield, Stuff A Cruiser, Winter Welcome, Bike Rodeo, UCONN Husky Run, Turkey Trot, and Lunch with a Trooper at Mansfield Schools.
- Animal Control responded to approximately 1,160 complaints, and issued 139 warnings, 16 notices to license, and 13 animal control infractions. Quarantined 22 dogs and three cats. Impounded 139 animals of which 36 were reclaimed, 99 were adopted out to new owners, six were struck by vehicles, and four were too injured or aggressive to place.

Public Works

The Department of Public Works (DPW) provides services for the operation, maintenance, and repair of the Town's fleet and infrastructure such as: roads; sidewalks; bridges; solid waste facilities; park and recreation areas; school athletic fields; sewers and sewer pump stations; and vehicles and equipment. The Facilities Management Department oversees the maintenance and cleanliness of all town facilities and school buildings.

Achievements:

- Replaced drainage structures on, reclaimed at full depth the existing surfaces of, and paved Timber, Thomas, Sumner, and Olsen Drives and a portion of Mulberry Road.
- Implemented the pavement preservation technique of cape seal on roads that did not need drainage improvements and had a pavement condition index rating above 60. The process involves an initial chip seal layer that is then covered by a micro-surface, a polymer-modified cold-application pavement layer. A contractor cape sealed these roads: Charles Lane, Fieldstone Drive, Lodi Drive, Lorraine Circle, Lorraine Drive East, Lorraine Drive, Oak Hill Road, Old Schoolhouse Road, Silver Falls Lane, and Willowbrook Road.
- Completed design and awarded a contract for the construction to replace the culvert on Hunting Lodge Road. Construction will be complete in the fall of 2024.
- Completed the design and awarded a contract for the sewer extension project supporting the Community Challenge Grant and the Eagleville Green project.

Mansfield Public Schools

Achievements:

- Mansfield Elementary School completed its inaugural, full academic year as Connecticut’s first new, net-zero school and was officially certified as such by producing more energy than it consumed during the past year.
- Bike Mansfield and the Eastern Highlands Health District collaborated with Mansfield Physical Education teachers to raise funds to purchase bicycles and provide volunteers to support a new grade four biking program. All fourth grade students were gifted with a helmet and provided instruction and practice on how to safely ride a bicycle. More than ten students had their first successful riding experience with a bicycle during this program!
- Mansfield Middle School becomes a new focus for Facilities now that the elementary school project is completed. The Facilities Department secured two state grants that will help upgrade security, HVAC, and elevator systems. New furniture, flooring, and stage lighting upgrades ensure that the school continues to support students, staff, and community members.
- Mansfield Public School educators and staff continue to ensure that “each and every child” is successful in school through various supports, resources, and services that include a new reading program, expanded mental health team, and robust professional learning. A measurable decrease in student chronic absences, monthly positive behavior student celebrations, and increased academic growth are strong indicators of success.

Affiliated Agencies

Mansfield Downtown Partnership, Inc:

- The Partnership continued its work to foster effective management and promotion of Downtown Storrs, a vibrant and economically successful community in the heart of Mansfield. The Partnership celebrated the opening of six new businesses in Downtown Storrs (Action Packed; Haven Hot Chicken; Huskies Restaurant & Bar; Nautical Bowls; Playa Bowls; and Square Peg Pizzeria). Over 8,300 people enjoyed community events hosted by the Partnership, including its 20th Annual Celebrate Mansfield Festival.
- In April, the Partnership bid a fond farewell to Cynthia van Zelm, who moved on to new opportunities after 22 years of dedicated leadership as the organization's Executive Director. A search to fill her position is underway.



Eastern Highlands Health District:

- The Health District continued to expand its scope of clinical services during fiscal year 2023/2024. Community health/clinical staff hosted 14 pop-up vaccination clinics during the fall viral respiratory season and distributed over 7,500 COVID-19 test kits to schools, daycares, and the general public.
- In partnership with a sister health district we have hosted a series of harm reduction events providing NARCAN training, kit distribution, and other harm reduction materials as part of our efforts to prevent opioid miss-use, and the associated fatalities in our local community.
- The Health District was awarded \$229,000 Workforce Development Grant that is funding additional training and professional development opportunities for staff.



Affiliated Agencies (continued)

Housing Authority:

The Mansfield Housing Authority has two state-financed properties. Holinko Estates is located on Zygmunt Drive in Storrs and is for moderate-income families. Wright's Village is located on Wright's Way in Storrs and is for seniors and younger individuals with disabilities. Both properties were designed for individuals and families with income less than 80% (low income) of the area median income.

There are no new construction projects being undertaken at Holinko Estates or Wright's Village. The Housing Authority has not sold, leased, or transferred any properties during the last year.

The Housing Authority manages Eagleville Green at 113 South Eagleville Road in Storrs for the Mansfield Nonprofit Housing Development Corporation (MNHDC). The Housing Authority is partnering (property management only, with no ownership interest) with the MNHDC to develop the property as a mixed income affordable housing property. The financing for the project closed in November of 2023 with an early start to construction at the end of September 2023. It is expected to be completed by the end of January 2025 and fully leased by June 2025.

Things You Need To Know

- ***Do I Need a Building Permit?***

Building permits are required for activities such as constructing, enlarging, altering, or demolishing a structure, changing the occupancy of a structure that requires greater strength, exits, or sanitary provisions, switching to another use, or installing or altering regulated equipment under the building code. If you are unsure whether a permit is necessary, please contact the Building Department at **860-429-3324** or email bldgdept@mansfieldct.org. - ***How Do I Register to Vote?***



You can register to vote or make changes to your existing registration securely online at voterregistration.ct.gov/OLVR/welcome.do. Alternatively, you can register by mail by printing an application from our website at mansfieldct.org/309/Registrar-of-Voters or register in person at the Town Clerk's Office.

- ***How Do I Get a Library Card?***

To obtain a free library card, visit the library with a valid photo ID and proof of residency (e.g., lease or mail). If your driver's license lists your Mansfield/Storrs address, no additional proof of residency is needed. For those under 16, a parent or guardian must accompany you to sign up. UConn students living on campus are eligible for a library card, which can be renewed every semester they reside on campus.
